Back in 2008, when the Association for the New Organ of the Auditoire de Calvin was set up, who would have thought that the organ would have been completed and installed by 2014?





The Auditoire de Calvin





Originally built in the 5th century, and enlarged in the 11th, it was known as "Notre-Dame La Neuve" from the 13th till the 16th century. Today, it is mainly known as the birthplace of the Geneva Reformation in the 1550s.

Today, it is still a living church used for regular worship, with congregations of the Dutch Reformed, Italian Waldensian, and Scottish Presbyterian churches holding their services in the Auditoire. Reformed Christians from around the world consider the Auditoire the birthplace of their faith. Every year, thousands of pilgrims visit the sanctuary seeking their Protestant roots, and tens of thousands of tourists come to learn about this internationally renowned building, as well as the Cathedral of St.-Pierre and the International Reformation Museum.

Having fallen into disuse, the Auditoire was restored in the 1950s with assistance from the World Alliance of Reformed Churches, and reopened in 1959.

Since 2007, the interior of the Auditoire has been gradually transformed.

• In 2007, new fused-glass windows were installed, designed by the Franco-German artist Udo Zembok, symbolising worship (orange east-west axis) and education (blue north-south axis).



• Construction of the new Aubertin organ started in 2012 and it was installed in spring 2014.

• Coinciding with the final stages of the organ project, a full "face-lift" of the interior was undertaken in early 2014, comprising restoration of the stonework and decorations, fresh paint, improved lighting, and new chairs.

The new organ described in this brochure is designed to play a major role both in worship and in concerts and recitals. The instrument, made by true craftsmen, is a work of art intended to last at least one hundred years, and to benefit generations of people who use the Auditoire de Calvin.

The Dream of a New Organ for the Auditoire



The Auditoire has long been a focus for Geneva musical life; in addition to religious services, many first-rate choral and chamber concerts are held in the church, benefiting from its fine acoustics and intimate setting.

However, the limitations of the previous organ, dating from 1964, made it unsuitable for solo recitals, and it was also less than ideal for accompanying choral and congregational singing.

An initiative to install a new organ was launched in 2005 by the organists of the Church of Scotland, Geneva, after organbuilders familiar with the Auditoire confirmed that the existing instrument could neither be expanded nor improved.

It was decided from the outset to limit the search to local firms. The organists therefore researched appropriate Swiss and French organbuilders, visiting instruments all over the area. On that basis, a short-list of organ-builders was drawn up, and proposals were submitted during the autumn and winter of 2006. In November 2007, the group, advised by François Delor, organist of Geneva's St Pierre Cathedral, finally selected Bernard Aubertin, a renowned organ-builder from the French Jura, to build the new organ.

The overall cost of the project was estimated at CHF 600'000. Fund-raising began in 2008.

The bulk of the funds required was collected in record time, thanks to the generosity of major foundations in Switzerland, countless private individuals, and many talented musicians who gave their time and talents to the project.

The project has benefited particularly from the support of the Foundation Hans Wilsdorf and the Loterie Romande.

The success of the fund-raising process was largely due to the invaluable support of our consultant, Léopold Borel.

The contract for the new organ was signed in November 2012; the old organ has found a new home with a congregation near Düsseldorf in Germany.

The dream of installing a beautiful, high-quality instrument, which can enrich Geneva's musical and religious life, has thus come true after eight years of hard work.

The Committee



A small committee of organists and others was formed to spearhead the organ project. Two of the organists of the Auditoire, Rebecca MacDonald (Secretary) and Linda Revkin, remained to see it through.



They were joined by Rev. Ian Manson (Chairman), James Pittendrigh (Treasurer), Christine Bunn, Charles Revkin (Webmaster) and Peter Tulloch, with **François Delor** as technical adviser and Léopold Borel as fund-raising consultant.

The shared motivation of the group was to leave a legacy to the Auditoire and to thank Geneva for the privilege of worshipping in this historic place.





The Association

The Association for the New Organ of the Auditoire de Calvin, or AOAC, was constituted under Swiss law in 2008. It has almost 100 subscribing members, and

three prominent honorary members, Professor Philippe Dinkel (Director of the Haute Ecole de Musique, Geneva), Ambassador Jean-Jacques Elmiger (Chief, International Labour Affairs, Swiss State Secretariat for Economic Affairs, Bern), and Professor Olivier Fatio (Founder and President of the International Museum of the Reformation, Geneva).

From the very beginning, the AOAC was active in organising fund-raising activities, including over 30 concerts in the Auditoire, a pipe sponsorship campaign (over 60 identified sponsors), a sponsored bike ride around Lake Geneva, a ceilidh (Scottish dinner dance), and appeals to banks, foundations, and companies.

Regular newsletters are sent to members to keep them informed of AOAC activities, and three visits to Bernard Aubertin's workshop have been organised.

The AOAC website is also constantly updated in order to keep the public informed of progress on the organ project.

Aubertin Organ

Bernard Aubertin has designed a two-manual mechanical-action pipe organ for the Auditoire de Calvin. The instrument has 19 stops (compared to ten on the previous organ) and two full manuals (the former instrument had only one complete manual). It is designed and voiced to project sound evenly throughout the Auditoire.

The organ case, built of oak, is decorated with symbols representing the Geneva Protestant Church, the Church of Scotland, and the Italian Waldensian Church.

The organ's specifications are as follows:





Bernard Aubertin, Master Organ-Builder





Bernard Aubertin is a master organ-builder based in the village of Courtefontaine (Jura, France) located between Dôle and Besançon. His company employs some 12 craftsmen, who use traditional organ-building methods. Its beautifully proportioned organ-cases are made of solid oak, with dowelled joints, hand-finished, and often display elegant ornamentation.

The Manufacture d'Orgues Aubertin divides its time between building new organs, restoring old instruments, and maintaining and repairing all types of organs.

Bernard Aubertin developed his taste for working with wood in his family's cabinetmaking business in Elvange (Moselle). After receiving an Arts Baccalaureate and studying for three years at the School of Decorative Arts in Strasbourg, he designed a number of instruments for firms, and also did short stints on the staff of two organ-

building companies, before setting up his own company at the age of 25.

He taught organ building for three years at the French National Training Centre for Apprentice Organ-Builders in Strasbourg. Aubertin's instruments are all designed and voiced by himself.

In 1994, Bernard Aubertin was awarded the Crédit du Nord Old French Homes Prize for his restoration of the 12th-century priory where he lives and works. In 1995 the French Ministry of Culture gave him the life title of Master Organ-Builder.

In 2006, he received an honorary Doctorate from the University of Aberdeen in Scotland for his new organ in King's College there, and for his work in general. In 2008, he installed a new organ in St John's College, Oxford. Other notable examples of his work in continental Europe can be found in the churches of St. Louis-en-l'Ile, Paris; Crozet in the Pays de Gex near Geneva; Clairvaux-les-Lacs in the French Jura; and Mariager, Denmark.
